LESSON 5: MERCY - JUDGING OTHERS

Lessons in this series: 1 2 3 4 5 Overview

This lesson teaches children that we all need forgiveness and that we should not have a fault-finding attitude toward others.

TOPICS

Attitude, Behavior, Child of God, Judging, Mercy, Reputation, Self-Worth

OPENING PRAYER AND PRAISE (5 minutes)

Praise and worship are an important part of a believer's life and children often learn best by watching and repeating what they see. So please, praise and worship together.

SCRIPTURE READING AND DISCUSSION (15 minutes)

Introduction:

In today's lesson, we are going to see what Jesus said about judging others. Before we begin, do you think Jesus would prefer to be on stage or in the audience? (There are no wrong answers just opinions.)

Read Matthew 7:1-5 (Judging Others)

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What happens when we judge others? (We, ourselves, are judged.)
- 2. What does it mean when the verse talks about a speck of sawdust in our brother's eye or a plank in our own eye? (The verse is talking about sin in our lives, not sawdust, or boards.)
- 3. What does Jesus say about pointing out someone else's sin? (He tells us to remove the sins from our lives before finding fault with others.)
- 4. Does this mean that we should overlook or ignore another person's sin? (No, we need to be aware of the sinful influences around us, but we should not have a harsh or fault-finding attitude towards others.)
- 5. How will removing the sin from our lives allow us to help others with their sins? (Knowing that we are sinners as well will help us be more merciful towards others.)
- 6. What do you think Jesus meant when He said, "with the measure you use, it will be measured to you"? (Allow for discussion.)
- 7. After reading those verses on judging others, would you change your answer on whether or not Jesus would prefer to be on stage or in the audience? Why? (Allow for discussion. There are no wrong answers just opinions.)

SUGGESTED PARENT/CHILD ACTIVITY

APPLICATION (4 minutes)

People have a fleshly instinct to judge others, to find weaknesses and faults. Yet, God wants us to love and not judge. When you are in a situation where you are about to judge someone, remind yourself that God is your Judge and He is their Judge as well. There should only be one Judge. James 4:12 states, "There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the one who is able to save and destroy. But you--who are you to judge your neighbor?" Also remember that Galatians 5:14 commands us to love our neighbor as we love ourselves.

CLOSING PRAYER (2 minutes)

THE BEATITUDES

MERCY STAFF

The children will make a craft that will remind them to be merciful.

TOPICS:

Leadership, Mercy

MATERIALS:

Large glow sticks or dowel rods (12 to 16 inch)
Hot glue, pipe cleaners
Cookie cutters: star, heart, circle
Colored card stock paper
Curling ribbon, stickers
Scissors



DURATION:

Approximately 15 minutes

PREPARATION:

Set out the materials on a table where the children will have enough room to work while also sharing supplies. Make a staff ahead of time as an example for your child.

WHAT YOU WILL DO:

Instruct your child to first choose a glow stick or dowel rod and then decide which supplies he or she would like to use to make a "mercy" staff. Ideas include twisting pipe cleaners together to make a special shape, using cookie cutters to cut out shapes from card stock paper, or using curling ribbon on the end of the staff – the possibilities are endless! Once decided, help your child hot glue their materials to the staff while explaining that an important quality trait for leaders is mercy.

Application:

Mercy means giving someone a second chance instead of punishing them for something they did wrong. Share with your child about a time when a leader gave you mercy and how his or her actions encouraged your faith. Explain that Jesus is the most merciful leader, but the leaders we encounter on earth – even biblical leaders – can easily forget to be merciful. We can be merciful and extend compassion to others when they hurt our feelings. And because a staff is used to extend rule, we can also use it to extend mercy!
